I need my ears and throat examined




My doctor needs to examine me to figure out why I am sick. This means they need to look in my ears and my mouth.



When the doctor looks in my ears and mouth, my job is to keep still so they can see clearly and get it done quickly.



When my ears are checked I can choose which ear the doctor checks first. The doctor will hold the top of my ear so they can see clearly.





The doctor will look in my ear with an otoscope. This is placed in my ear and acts as a telescope; it has a light to help the doctor see inside my ear. It will last a few seconds.



When my mouth is checked I need to open my mouth really wide and poke my tongue out so the doctor can see my throat. I can help the doctor by doing a big "roooarrrrr" like a lion or dinosaur.



Sometimes the doctor will help me to move my tongue out of the way by placing a pop stick on my tongue and gently pushing down. This may feel a bit uncomfortable but it won't last long.



When I am having my ears and mouth checked I can sit on my caregiver's lap or have them close by so I feel safe. If I find it tricky to keep still my caregiver can help hold me.







Now that I'm done I can do something that settles me if I'm upset, or find an activity to do while I wait.
